E. Second Reading of Ordinances

1. T18-05 State Route 113 Billboard Revisions. Applicant: Tilley Properties, Inc. Text Amendment to Chapter 20, Article II, Sign Ordinance, Sec. 20-29, Billboards.

Randy Mannino, stated billboards are not allowed on E. Main Street. The only existing billboard, and focus of this amendment, was approved prior to the current sign ordinance adoption. This amendment would allow static and LED billboards along E. Main St within 2700ft of the centerline of I-75. Revisions to the Main Street Overlay District ordinance are not required.

1. **2019 Calendar Printing**

Rebecca Bohlander, Public Relations and Communications Manager recommended approval of the only bid from A New Dimension Graphic Design & Printing for \$9,029.84.

A motion to approve the 2019 Calendar Printing by A New Dimension Graphic Design & Printing was made by Council Member Stepp and seconded by Council Member Wren. Motion carried unanimously. Vote: 5-0.

Historic Downtown Water Main Replacement 2.

Bob Jones, Water Department Head stated Phase I will construct approximately 1,800-

feet of 12-inch ductile iron water main. The project will run from the Chamber of Commerce, behind Young Brothers Pharmacy, cross Main Street at the railroad tracks and continue to Cherokee Street

Installation of these lines will allow the City to abandon approximately 1,200-feet of 1880's era 10-inch cast iron main, dramatically increase fire flow capabilities, and improve water quality in the area. Two bids were received for this project on October 4, 2018 from the following contractors: RDJE, Inc. – Newnan, GA; \$1,397,102.40; Site Engineering, Inc. – Atlanta, GA; \$1,494,299.04.

The design engineer, G. Ben Turnipseed, has certified the bids and recommended award to RDJE in the amount indicated above. \$1,250,000 was allocated for this project in our FY18-19 budget, to be funded with \$950,000 in bond proceeds and \$300,000 from an ARC Grant. \$1,200,000 was borrowed for this project because of rising material prices and increased infrastructure workload between the March budget submission and the June issuance of debt. Adding the \$300,000 ARC Grant, there is \$1,500,000 in available funds for the project. For this reason, the approval of the RDJE bid is recommended despite being over our budgeted amount. The Water Department has adequate funds to cover those changes despite the higher than expected bids.

A motion to approve the Historic Downtown Water Main Replacement was made by Council Member Stepp and seconded by Council Member Wren. Motion carried unanimously. Vote: 5-0.

3. Bartow County Purchase Meter - Grassdale Road

Mr. Jones stated the Bartow County Water Department (BCWD) plans to construct a new purchase point on the Cartersville Water Department (CWD) system along Grassdale Road. As has been the case with other wholesale purchase points, the cost of construction will be borne by the BCWD. The new purchase point presents an opportunity for the CWD to install and test a new type of meter system. The new system can be compared to the conventional system installed by BCWD for accuracy and reliability.

The new system will be capable of sending real time meter readings from the purchase point. This capability, if deployed to other high-volume purchase points, would allow better operation of the Water Treatment Plant (WTP) as well as quicker response to increases in demand. Pricing for an 8-inch Master Meter Octave Mag Meter was requested from Consolidated Pipe and Supply (Consolidated), a sole source provider. They provided a price of \$13,213.31 for the meter, vault and all fittings needed for installation.

Mr. Jones would like to request a not to exceed authorization of \$20,000 to include purchase of material from Consolidated and any additional installation cost. This project will be paid through account 505.3320.54.1513 – Meters and Settings. This account is a capital improvement account and has a zero balance in the current budget because this project was unknown at the time of budget preparation.

Motion to approve the Bartow County Purchase Meter – Grassdale Road with a not to

exceed authorization of \$20,000 to include purchase of material from Consolidated and any additional installation cost was made by Council Member Stepp and seconded by Council Member Wren. Motion unanimously. Vote: 5-0.

Motion to add an item to the agenda was made by Council Member Stepp and seconded by Council Member Roth. Motion carried unanimously. Vote: 5-0.

Added Item: GPS Unit

Mr. Jones requested authorization to purchase a GPS unit for the Water Department. The current unit has internal hardware issues, is over 12 years old, and it would be most cost effective to purchase a new one instead of repairing the old one. \$8,200 is repair cost and \$10,149 is the new purchase price.

Motion to approve the purchase of a new GPS Unit for the Water Department was made by Council Member Stepp and seconded by Council Member Wren. Motion carried unanimously. Vote: 5-0.

4. Purchase of Copier/Printer for Administrative Services

Chief Frank McCann requested approval to purchase a copier/printer for Administrative Services of the Police Department. Our current copier/printer is old and is constantly in need of repair.

The Police Department sent a request for bids (RFB) for a copier/printer to three companies and received three bids. The following are the bids for the copier/printer from each company that met the specifications: Canon \$5,397.00; Toshiba \$5,019.40; Xerox \$4,867.86.

Chief McCann recommended the best bid, Toshiba, for \$5,019.40, because of the better warranty at no monthly cost. This is a budgeted item and the E-Verify and E-Save documents have been submitted to the Police Department and are on file. Chief McCann requested Council support and recommendation for this purchase.

A motion to approve Purchase of Copier/Printer for Administrative Services was made by Council Member Stepp and seconded by Council Member Roth. Motion carried unanimously. Vote: 5-0.

5. 2019 Health Insurance Renewal

Dan Porta, Assistant City Manager stated for calendar year 2018, the City changed to United Healthcare (UHC) from Blue Cross and Blue Shield (BC/BS) and are covered under a fully insured plan. We offered 3 plans for employees to choose from, as follows:

The first UHC plan was a "Motion Plan" where employees can wear a fitness tracking device which can help them reduce (offset) their deductible and copays. The Motion Plan offered

\$25 copays to primary physicians and \$40 copays to specialists, along with our \$1,500 single deductible/\$3,000 family deductible. Employees were not mandated to wear the fitness tracking devices and only approximately 118 employees/spouses signed up for the tracking devices. A majority of City employees signed up for this plan.

The second UHC plan that was offered provided some changes in copays and deductibles, so if an employee chose this plan they could pay a lower monthly premium but be subject to higher copay and deductibles. The City did not have any employees sign up for this plan in 2018. The third plan offered for 2018 was an HSA and we had 6 employees sign up for this plan.

Unfortunately, our health insurance claims have been running higher and UHC came in with a 25.9% rate increase. Shaw Hankins has shopped the market and received proposals back from a few other insurance carriers as follows:

·Aetna – declined to quote

·BC/BS – fully insured: 10.5% premium increase over current year. Also, submitted self-insured plan at 22.8% increase over current year.

·Cigna – fully insured: 7.5% premium increase over current year

·Meritain – self-funded plan with 29.5% premium increase over current year

·Humana – proposal received, but uncompetitive

As our overall employee health insurance claims increase, the cost for health insurance continues to rise. A brief history of recent health insurance providers is as follows:

 $\cdot 2017 - BC/BS$ – one-year term. Renewal for 2018 came in with a 21% rate increase, so we switched providers.

·2018 – UHC – Renewal for 2019 came in with 25.9% rate increase.

Out of the proposals received between BC/BS and Cigna, staff recommendation would be to go with BC/BS because of the following:

- 1. BC/BS provider network includes Children's Healthcare at Egleston which has been used by employees previously and this hospital is not in the Cigna network.
- 2. Cigna Insurance was a previous provider for the City and we had some issues with insurance claims being processed correctly.

A motion to approve Blue Cross Blue Shield was made by Council Member Stepp and seconded by Council Member Wren. Motion carried unanimously. Vote: 5-0.

6. 2019 Medicare Supplement Insurance Renewal

Mr. Porta stated United HealthCare (UHC) has provided the Medicare supplement insurance for City retirees for several years and the insurance premium renewal for 2019 is 0.6% less than the current year premiums.

UHC current premium rate is: Sr. Supp: \$191.87; PDP: \$162.21; Total: \$354.08. 2019 proposed rate, based on the current 2018 plan design, is: Sr. Supp: \$191.68; PDP: \$160.25; Total: \$351.93. Mr. Porta recommended renewal of the Medicare supplement insurance with UHC for 2019.

A motion to approve 2019 Medicare Supplement Insurance Renewal was made by Council Member Cooley and seconded by Council Member Wren. Motion carried unanimously. Vote: 5-0.

7. 2019 Employee Wellness Program

Council Member Stepp made a motion to table the item in order to gather more information. Motion was seconded by Council Member Roth. Motion carried unanimously. Vote: 5-0

8. Fire Station #3 Guaranteed Maximum Price Agreement

Mr. Porta stated that he and Chief Carter met with representatives from Abuck, Inc., Construction Manager at Risk, and Croft & Associates, Architect, to discuss the guaranteed maximum price (GMP) for Fire Station #3 which initially came in at \$3,563,044 and ways to possibly reduce that cost. Based on our meeting, Abuck has made changes to the GMP which is now \$3,326,978, a reduction of \$236,066 from their original proposal. However, some of the items that were deducted from the GMP were items that the City was going to directly contract for like the generator, low voltage installation including data drops and the access control readers.

A new estimated project costs for Fire Station #3 based on the revised GMP is attached. Therefore, based on the revised GMP and ancillary project costs, Fire Station #3 is estimated to cost \$3,659,978.

Keep in mind that Fire Station #3 was budgeted from 2014 SPLOST funds and our projected cost was \$2,600,000 which is \$1,059,978 over the projected SPLOST budget. The good news is that the 2014 SPLOST collections through October 2018 have improved and it is projected that the City may have an additional \$990,302 in SPLOST funds available. This projection is based on the average revenue collections for the 57 months that have been collected, and using this average to estimate for the remaining 15 months left to collect.

A motion to approve the City to move forward on Fire Station #3 with the revised GMP from ABuck was made by Council Member Stepp and seconded by Council Member Wren. Motion carried unanimously. Vote: 5-0.

Sec. 16.3. Additional restrictions.

- A. In the interest of the public health, safety and welfare, the Mayor and Council may exercise limited discretion in evaluating the site proposed for a use which requires a Special use. In exercising such discretion pertaining to the subject use, the Mayor and Council may consider the following, which shall be stated in writing by the applicant and submitted to the department of planning and development to initiate an application for a Special Use permit:
 - 1. The effect of the proposed activity on traffic flow along adjoining streets;

 - 4. Hours and manner of operation of the proposed use;

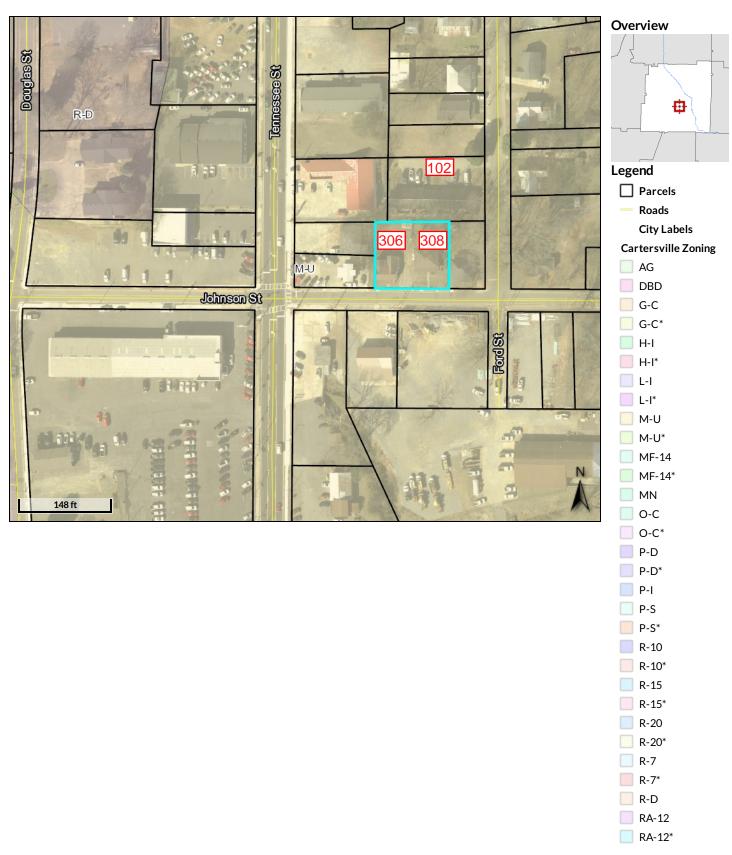

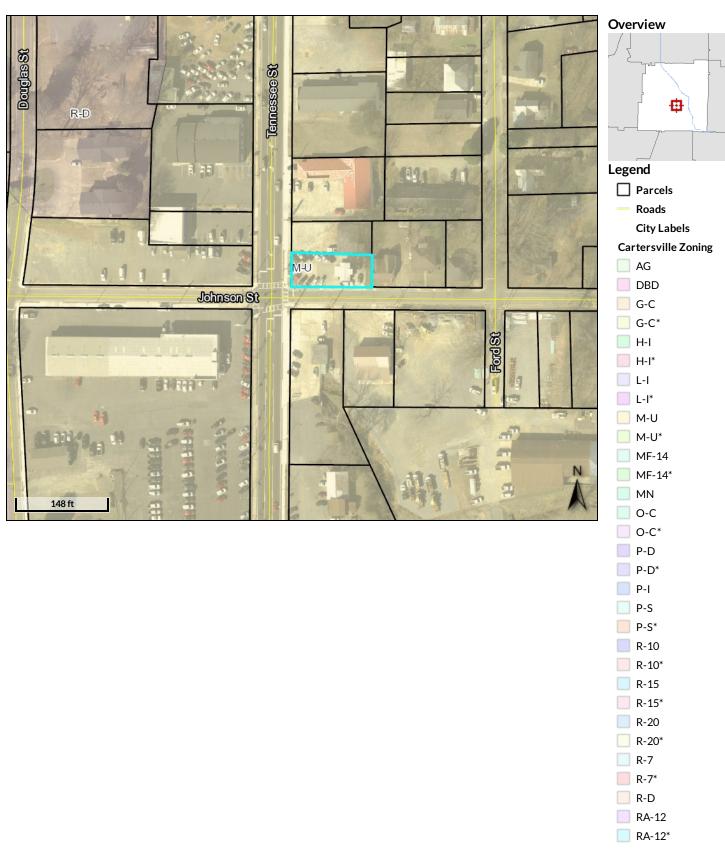

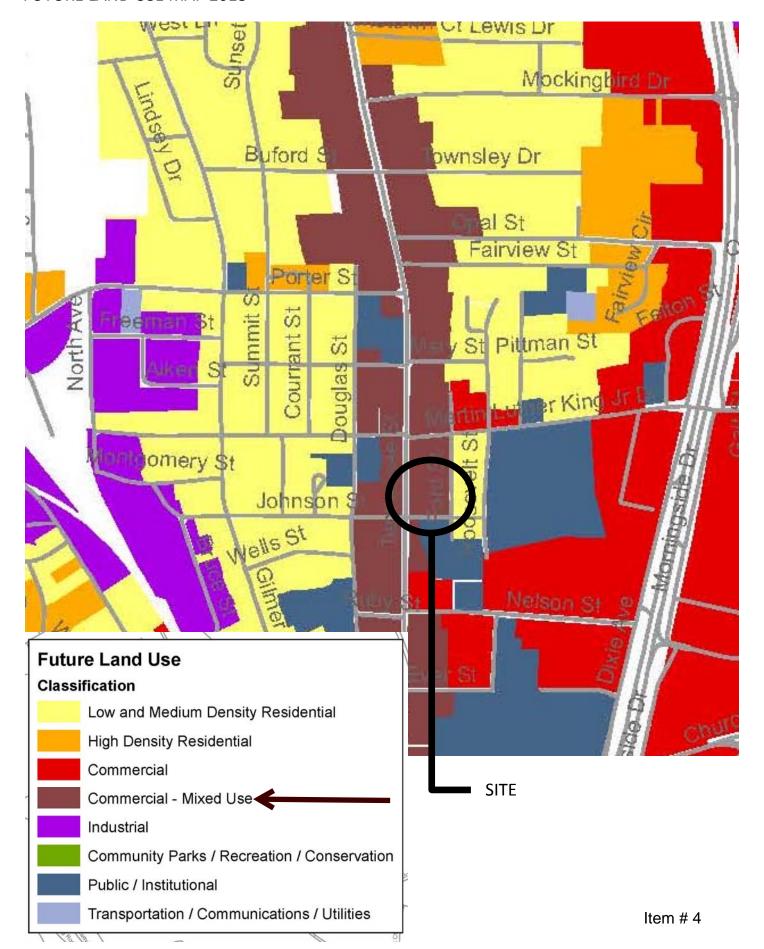
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FUTURE LAND USE MAP 2018

- Traditional Neighborhoods Traditional neighborhood development patterns should be encouraged, including the use of more human scale development, compact development, mixing of uses within easy walking distance of one another, and facilitating pedestrian safety.
- Transportation Alternatives Alternatives to transportation by automobile, including
 mass transit, bicycle routes, and pedestrian facilities, should be made available in each
 community. Greater use of alternate transportation should be encouraged.
- Growth Preparedness Each community should identify and put in place the prerequisites for the type of growth it seeks to achieve. These might include infrastructure
 (roads, water, sewer) to support new growth, appropriate training of the workforce, ordinances and regulations to manage growth as desired, or leadership capable of responding
 to growth opportunities and managing new growth when it occurs.

Implementation

Implementation requirements will vary based on location and availability of public infrastructure and utilities.

■ Tennessee Street Corridor

The Tennessee Street Corridor is a predominantly commercial corridor which connects downtown to the north side of Cartersville. The corridor is generally defined as all parcels fronting Tennessee Street on either side of the right-of-way. Streetscape improvements, signage, non-vehicular circulation options, development guidelines for consistent setbacks, implementation of traffic controlling measures, pedestrian enhancements, underground utilities, and targeted infill and redevelopment strategy will be utilized to create an attractive commercial corridor with multiple circulation alternatives. Social Intersections should be established, which are activity areas for social interaction and retail corresponding to intersections along Tennessee Street. Consider the cross sections of Church Street, Nelson and Ruby Streets, Martin Luther King, Jr. Drive, Opal Street, Buford Street, Mockingbird Drive, Gentilly Boulevard, Quail Run, and Pointe North Drive.

A study was performed by DCA between 2005-2008 to create an overlay district for this corridor. The recommendations of the study should be reviewed and implemented, if still feasible. Tennessee Street is a State Highway, Hwy 61. GA DOT will need to be included in projects impacting the Right-of way.

Development Strategies

- Encourage compatible architecture styles and materials that maintain the local character;
- Wherever possible, connect to regional network of greenspace and trails, available to pedestrians, and bicyclists.
- Create small public spaces at pre-identified nodes to serve as meeting points, focal points or landmarks.
- Design for greater pedestrian orientation and access, more character with attractive clustering of buildings, leaving pocket parks with benches, fountains, and meeting spots within the center:
- Convert the Corridor to an attractive boulevard with signage guiding visitors to downtown and scenic areas around the community;
- Mechanical equipment should be screened from public view and sited so as not to cause noise impacts on adjacent properties. Trash and garbage enclosures should be restricted to rear yard areas;
- Provide basic access for pedestrians and bicycles, consider vehicular safety measures including driveway consolidation and raised medians (which also improve safety for bike/pedestrians); and
- Coordinate land uses and bike/pedestrian facilities with transit stops, where applicable.

Community Quality Objectives

The following Quality Community Objectives, or elements thereof, as established by the Georgia Department of Community Affairs, are achieved by implementation of this Character Area:

- Regional Identity Each region should promote and preserve a regional "identity" or regional sense of place, defined in terms of traditional architecture, common economic linkages that bind the region together, or other shared characteristics.
- Heritage Preservation The traditional character of the community should be maintained through preserving and revitalizing historic areas of the community, encouraging new development that is compatible with the traditional features of the community, and protecting other scenic or natural features that are important to defining the community's character.
- Infill Development Communities should maximize the use of existing infrastructure and minimize the conversion of undeveloped land at the urban periphery by encouraging development or redevelopment of sites closer to the downtown or traditional urban core of the community.
- Sense of Place Traditional downtown areas should be maintained as the focal point of the community, or, for newer areas where this is not possible, the development of activity centers that serves as community focal points should be encouraged. These community focal points should be attractive, mixed-use, pedestrian friendly places where people choose to gather for shopping, dining, socializing and entertainment.
- Traditional Neighborhoods Traditional neighborhood development patterns should be encouraged, including the use of more human scale development, compact development, mixing of uses within easy walking distance of one another, and facilitating pedestrian safety.

- Appropriate Businesses The businesses and industries encouraged to develop or expand in a community should be suitable for the community in terms of job skills required, long term sustainability, linkages to other economic activities in the region, impact on the resources of the area, and future prospects for expansion and creation of higher skill job opportunities.
- **Employment Options** A range of job types should be provided in each community to meet the diverse needs of the local workforce.
- Transportation Alternatives Alternatives to transportation by automobile, including
 mass transit, bicycle routes, and pedestrian facilities, should be made available in each
 community. Greater use of alternate transportation should be encouraged.

Implementation

- Identify infrastructure and utility issues or deficiencies and develop a corrective action plan.
- Review, revise and implement the Overlay District study recommendations completed in 2008.
- Create usable, landscaped sidewalks; drainage improvements; pedestrian lighting (interspersed w/ overhead); traffic calming devices; uniform architectural design standards; underground design and placement of utilities; pedestrian miniparks; and curb-cut guidelines;
- Establish the Tennessee Street Garden District Overlay and associated development of the following standards: greenspace; minimal setbacks; improved appearance standards; architectural and building materials; site specific buffer requirements; landscape; shielded parking; density; signage; underground utilities; interconnectivity; pervious surface area; and lighting;
- Expand the number of zoning districts permitted within the Tennessee Street Corridor;
- Provide incentives to stimulate redevelopment;
- Promote interconnectivity between commercial uses throughout the district to minimize curb cuts;
- Develop the following ordinances: architectural and design; sign; and outdoor storage;
- Identify funding opportunities/develop incentives to encourage neighborhood business owners to hire from neighborhood work force through the creation of a Neighborhood Employment Program.

■ Transitional Use Area

Areas suitable for designation as Transitional Use Areas are those originally developed for single-family homes that have or will become impacted by adjacent thoroughfares and commercial encroachment and may no longer be suitable primarily for residential use. In the past, individual properties have been rezoned and converted in a way that has often been disruptive from an urban design sense: parking lots have replaced front lawns; houses have been remodeled unprofessionally, resulting in structures with incoherent design elements; and signage has often been out of proportion to the structure and use advertised.

In order to propose an orderly, safe and aesthetic transition, properties within designated Transitional Use Area corridors can be considered for nonresidential use at an intensity compatible with

surrounding residential areas that maintain the essential residential "look" and feel of the area. Designation of this corridor is meant to encourage public and private investment that will promote vitality, activity and safety in the area, by controlling aesthetics, site planning and limiting nonresidential uses that will not overly impact existing residential neighborhoods adjacent to the site.

Transitional Use Areas are, generally, located along or adjacent to arterial or collector thoroughfares.

Development Strategies

- A new use should be compatible with the adjoining neighborhood and not attract a high volume of traffic or visitors, have late night or early morning hours of operation, produce outdoor sound or other distractions, or serve a market area that extends beyond the adjacent neighborhoods and passers-by. Generally, professional and business office uses, personal services and local-serving retail sales establishments, small-scale religious and other non-profit institutions, and other low-intensity neighborhood services are compatible with houses:
- The conversion's remodeling should be architecturally compatible with the neighborhood and
 must upgrade or at least be consistent with the basic architecture of the structure. Architectural integrity and compatibility considerations include siting of the building, massing, proportion, scale, materials, colors, details, façade treatment, lighting and signage;
- New building design should take into consideration the unique qualities and the dominant character of the surrounding area;
- New occupancies in converted houses should be limited to one business enterprise (with one business entrance) for structures under 2,000 square feet of gross leasable area;
- Signs should be consistent with the form and materials of the building. Illuminated signs would not be permitted when adjacent to existing residential uses;
- Mechanical equipment should be screened from public view and sited so as not to cause noise impacts on adjacent properties. Trash and garbage enclosures should be restricted to rear yard areas; and
- Landscaping must be installed in areas not designated for parking and circulation.

Community Quality Objectives

The following Quality Community Objectives, or elements thereof, as established by the Georgia Department of Community Affairs, are achieved by implementation of this Character Area:

- Heritage Preservation The traditional character of the community should be maintained through preserving and revitalizing historic areas of the community, encouraging new development that is compatible with the traditional features of the community, and protecting other scenic or natural features that are important to defining the community's character.
- Infill Development Communities should maximize the use of existing infrastructure and minimize the conversion of undeveloped land at the urban periphery by encouraging development or redevelopment of sites closer to the downtown or traditional urban core of the community.
- Transportation Alternatives Alternatives to transportation by automobile, including
 mass transit, bicycle routes, and pedestrian facilities, should be made available in each
 community. Greater use of alternate transportation should be encouraged.

- Housing Choices A range of housing size, cost, and density should be provided in each community to make it possible for all who work in the community to also live in the community (thereby reducing commuting distances), to promote a mixture of income and age groups in each community, and to provide a range of housing choice to meet market needs.
- Growth Preparedness Each community should identify and put in place the prerequisites for the type of growth it seeks to achieve. These might include infrastructure (roads, water, sewer) to support new growth, appropriate training of the workforce, ordinances and regulations to manage growth as desired, or leadership capable of responding to growth opportunities and managing new growth when it occurs.
- Regional Identity Each region should promote and preserve a regional "identity" or regional sense of place, defined in terms of traditional architecture, common economic linkages that bind the region together, or other shared characteristics.
- Regional Cooperation Regional cooperation should be encouraged in setting priorities, identifying shared needs, and finding collaborative solutions, particularly where it is critical to success of a venture, such as protection of natural resources or development of a transportation network.

Implementation

- Adopt design and use requirements to guide new construction and adaptive reuse and conversion of existing structures that will assure compatibility with remaining residences on the road and with surrounding neighborhoods;
- Develop design guidelines for Lower Hwy 41; and
- Develop design guidelines for any large area targeted for redevelopment.

Summer Hill

Summer Hill is an historic African American community located northwest of downtown Carters-ville. The community continues today to serve as an authentic area of character with a mix of residences, churches, civic facilities, and small-scale commercial. A variety of housing, including small lot single family housing as well as small apartment buildings may be accommodated.

The Summer Hill School was built in 1954 and closed in the 1980s, abandoned and left to decay. In 2001 the Etowah Area Consolidated Housing Authority (EHA) took over ownership of the former Summer Hill School and the adjacent 17 acre recreational complex located on Aubrey Street, and facilities have been renovated. The 2006 Summer Hill Project, partially supported by a grant from the Anheuser Busch Corporation, is a partnership between Kennesaw State, the Etowah Valley Consolidated Housing Foundation and the Summer Hill Foundation to assist the neighborhood in recovering and preserving its history.

	For calendar year 2018, the City Council approved an agreement with Corporate Health Partners (CHP) to offer a voluntary wellness program where employees could have a biometric screening done and meet with a Health Coach one time to go over their results. We had approximately 90 out of 285 total employees (fire personnel were not included because they have a more comprehensive mandated program) to participate. The cost for the CHP program for calendar year 2018 was about \$10,500 out of \$30,000 provided by UHC.
	For calendar 2019, Blue Cross & Blue Shield (BCBS) is offering \$50,000 for wellness. Corporate Health Partners has provided two quotes for a more comprehensive wellness program that could be implemented in 2019 if the City Council would like. The proposals are attached and the proposed cost for the entire program under each option is as follows:
Department Summary	Option 1 – Prima Worksite Wellness Services - \$103,876
Recomendation:	Option 2 – Health Awareness Program and Culture Building - \$59,042
	These two programs proposed by CHP are more extensive than the base program that was offered in calendar year 2018. If the City Council elects to go with the base program of biometric screening, Health Risk Assessment plus 30 minutes of results coaching per participant, the total cost will be approximately \$29,000. This is for all city employees except for the Fire Department personnel who are already being tested under the SiteMed comprehensive program.
	If the City Council would like us to move forward on one of these programs, the cost could be offset by the wellness dollars from BC/BS, and any remaining balance could be covered by the City or added to the insurance premiums which are shared by the City and employees. Note that since wellness programs are voluntary some companies incentivize their insurance plan by offering wellness participants a discounted insurance premium. Thosewho 1

	elect not to participate will pay a higher premium and help fund the wellness program.
City Manager's Remarks:	You now have three options. The first two listed above are more extensive than some of your discussion included. The base program, which I believe was the direction the Mayor and Jayce recommended would include a biometric screening, health risk assessment and a coaching session. This option would run about \$29,000 and would allow the additional funding that is available through BCBS to be used for wellness related purchases for the City. As before, your direction on the wellness program is needed. There was not a significant amount of participation with the previous program but if Council wishes, those who elect to participate in the wellness program can be incentivized. This could include a \$20 per pay period (or whatever amount Council recommends) reduction to their monthly insurance cost while those who elect to not participate would pay \$20 more per pay period. Again, we cannot make participation in the wellness program mandatory but we can incentivize those who do participate.
Financial/Budget Certification:	The wellness plan for 2019 is not a budgeted item. However, the cost, if approved, will need to be covered by either the city or a combination of the city and the employees.

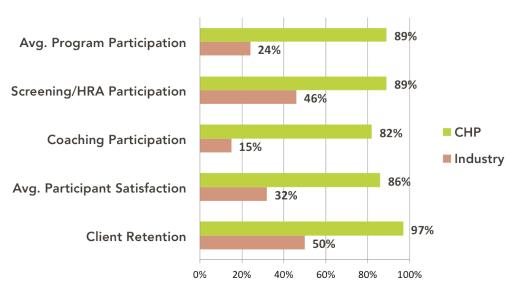

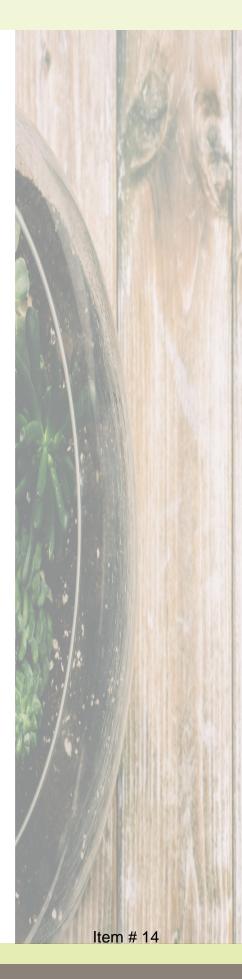

HEALTH COACHING STEP 2

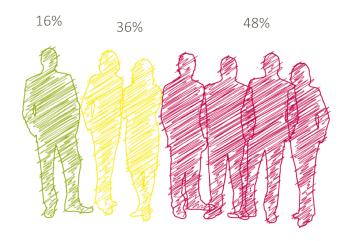
After analyzing the assessments, we triage participants into levels of High, Moderate, and Low Risk. We begin with an initial 30 minute "Results" coaching session, followed by a series of 15 minute sessions to review goals, establish accountability, motivation, and problem solving. Coaching is primarily **onsite**, but also available by video conference, phone, or secure messaging where needed.

Real value on investment

What investment is needed? Two perspectives produce the same recommendation:

1. How to flatten the trend?

Healthcare costs for U.S. employers averages over \$10,000 pepy. An increase of 10% annually is \$1000 pepy. Wellness should earn at least \$2 per \$1 invested, so to offset \$1000 pepy increases, you'd need \$500 pepy investment in wellness.

2. Doing your fair share?

Only 5% of the national expenditure for healthcare in the USA goes towards wellness. Employers also reap productivity returns from wellness, which are 3 times the direct medical savings, so employers should at least match that 5%.. So, $5\% \times 10,000$ /year also yields \$500 pepy. Dee Edington, the wellness guru from the University of Michigan, recommends that in the future employers should increase the wellness investment from 5% to 20%.

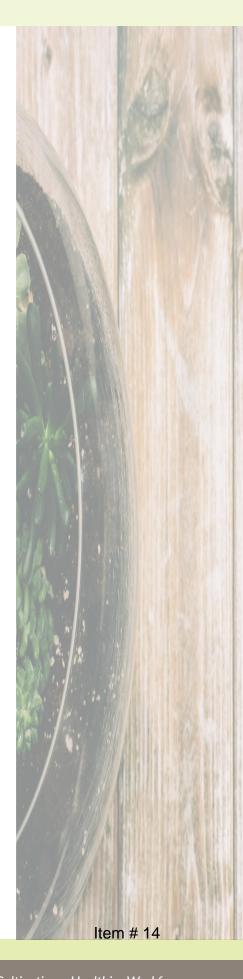
